

***If you shop at Dover Saddlery often in Wexford, Pa. you may recognize this smiling face!
WPDA member Kim Baierl works at Dover. I saw her at the Grand opening and asked if I could
interview her for the WPDA NewsBits!***

Q: How is it you came to work at Dover's new store in Wexford? Obviously you applied after you learned they were moving here?

A: In the fall I saw a post on WPDA's Facebook page about Dover Saddlery coming to Pittsburgh. I quickly went to the Dover site to confirm the "rumor" and was so excited to have a new tack store coming to our area. A week after seeing the announcement we purchased my daughter's (Grace) first pony with the understanding that she was responsible for buying her own equipment/supplies and paying for her own competition entry fees. As you know, with a pony comes a long shopping list of wants and needs. Horse friends and family have been wonderful to Grace and blessed her with most of her starting necessities like slightly used saddle pads, a bit, a lead line, and a girth. The pony came with a halter, shipping boots, and a winter blanket. I think the only thing she really needed to purchase was a bridle and an extra halter which she did at Dover in Chantilly, VA. I grew up in Northern Virginia shopping at Dominion Saddlery. About 10 years ago Dover acquired the Chantilly, VA store. Usually on my visits to my family I stop in Dover and browse around and pick up a few items. While we were in the store in November I chatted with the employees about working for Dover. The pieces started to fall into place as I needed to supplement the cost of an additional horse and Grace was eligible for the employee discount since she was my dependent.

Q: Is it hard to not buy everything in the store?

A: Growing up in a military family I learned quickly how to have horses on a budget. I was never really permitted to splurge on horsey-items, we stuck with the basics. Since working at Dover I feel like a kid in a candy store and it is so tempting to buy something every time I walk into the store. When you are surrounded by lots of good products and people giving testimonials about products, it is hard to resist. Dover management says that most employees spend all of their first couple of paychecks on Dover purchases. I've managed to spend less than I make so I guess that is a fiscally good place to be.

Q: Who do you mainly shop for at Dover?

A: I'd love to say that most of my purchases have been for my horse but he has gotten the short-end of the stick. As an employee we have a Dover polo shirt to wear to work or we can wear any shirt purchased from Dover with a Dover apron over the shirt. After the Grand Opening weekend I was ready to have some other shirt options to wear so my first purchase was a couple of shirts. Since then, most of the purchases have been made by Grace for her pony.

Q: What is your favorite part about working at Dover?

A: I guess it would be trite to say the people but it is pretty neat to be surrounded by horse-people all day. What other job would allow me to know so many customers by name, permit me to shop with my friends, provide me the opportunity to meet new equestrians, and to work with other horse enthusiasts? If you get excited opening presents then you'd probably agree that the next best thing is unpacking shipments of products.

Q: Do you find it is mostly dressage riders who shop at Dover or hunt seat riders?

A: Dover attracts all sorts of riders from pleasure riders, endurance riders, some Western riders, a lot of youth taking lessons, and dressage riders. From my conversations with customers I believe there are more hunter/jumper riders in the store than any of the other disciplines.

Q: Anything else you would like to add?

A: Dover has a resource binder and a bulletin board if anyone wants to promote boarding facilities, lesson programs, camps, professional services, clinics, shows, etc. One can't promote the sale of used tack at Dover so having the classified section in the newsletter is a blessing.

Grace Baierl's D4K Experience

"It's definitely a small world after all! I never thought that buying a Connemara through Emily Daily would connect me with so many other people."

I had been riding at a lesson barn since I was six years old. One of my first big outings as a horse-lover was going to watch the 2010 World Equestrian Games, WEG. While I was walking around at WEG I was fortunate enough to learn about Pony Club. A few months after my return from WEG I decided to join the Harts Run Hunt Pony Club. My Pony Club was able to broaden my learning about riding, and helped me discover dressage and eventing. After leasing a pony for three years and earning my D3 I decided it was time for me to move up and get my own horse.

My pony's name is Catskill Nola. She is a 14.1 black Connemara. She was owned and trained by Carol Kozlowski. Nola is out of Cobweb Allison and Tre Awain Dobh McDuff, and bred by Catskill Connemaras. Nola is a very good girl, but it took me some time to get used to her excitable personality. Although Nola is an amazing kid's pony, including letting me do around-the-world; sliding off her backside; hacking and schooling through water; she can be a bit of a challenge.

I have worked with her to become relaxed and calm in new situations and to have her stand still which is a constant area that needs improvement. One of the multiple activities I enjoy participating in with Nola under saddle is jumping. It helps her

change up her work routine and gives her something different on which to focus. While on the ground I love to braid Nola's extra thick tail. It is a nice pleasurable and bonding experience to do after a ride. In the past ten months that I have owned Nola

I have learned more than I could imagine. Two of the main things that I have learned are that the absence of punishment is not a reward and if I stay relaxed the horse will stay relaxed. After attending Lendon Gray's Dressage For Kids last year I was looking forward to coming again with my own pony. Even though it is a long ten hour drive from my home town of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania I knew it would be worth it to come back this year.

I have to say that a ten hour drive definitely doesn't feel like a small world. Like usual, D4K was an outstanding experience for me and my horse. I am very thankful that Western Pennsylvania Dressage Association was able to send a team

of fourteen girls that proudly wore their black and gold. My favorite thing about D4K was that I had the pleasure of meeting Amy Plavin, her pony Millie, and her rider Cailey. Ms. Amy was able to tell me a bit about the background of my pony and she knows the half-brother and half-sister of my pony. She was able to inform me about the previous owner and the history and condition of Nola. Ms. Amy encouraged me to join the American Connemara Pony Society which I plan to do sometime soon. I learned that Connemaras are sturdy, smart, a good pony for kids and I hope to learn more about the breed.

D4K was my first time riding Training Level Test #3 and I was pleased to place third in this class. This score was combined with a written test and Dressage Seat Equitation score to help me place 6th overall in my age group. One of the things I won was World-Class Grooming for Horses. I'd like to use the book to learn how to make button braids. My WPDA team was third out of about 71 teams. I was happy to be on a team with my friends and to have placed well. On Sunday I rode a Prix Caprilli test which is a dressage test with jumps included. Nola enjoyed jumping while the freestyle music played for another ring. The show was a wonderful experience, and I would definitely recommend it for other youth riders.

"No Foot, No Horse"

The Farmer's Almanac was predicting another hot, wet summer for this year and that's what we got. It appears to be letting up a little, but that wet weather did its share of damage on horse's hooves. Chronic Thrush, hoof wall

separations and even abscess's are all too common in this type of weather. Contrary to popular belief moisture is not a friend of the hoof. Dry feet are healthier feet. Most infections like thrush (figure 1 and 2), cracks and hoof wall separations (figure 3) are caused by excess moisture. Giving "clean" feet an opportunity to be in a dry environment is very beneficial to their overall health. Hard dry feet do make my job a little harder, but working a little harder on a healthy foot is still nicer than working on an unhealthy one. There are some preventive measures that can be taken to help reduce the chance of having an un-healthy hoof and possibly added expense to your hoof care cost. Cleaning the feet daily by picking out the dirt and debris with a hoof pick and using a stiff brush to get the areas that the pick couldn't get, will allow oxygen to get in to the hoof cavity and naturally kill most of the problem causing bacteria.

Then, at least a couple times a week, you should treat the valleys and sulcus of the frog (the center of the frog, back between the bulbs of the heel) with a good thrush medicine such as "Thrush Buster". For the sole of the hoof, in the past I recommend coating it with 7% or higher iodine, but thanks to illegal drug makers it cannot be purchased. Now I suggest using a product called "Durasole". I've seen very good results from it if used properly. For those of you that bathe your horses frequently, you should clean the hoof wall off with a stiff brush, then apply a sealant, such as "Tuff Stuff" or "Hoof Guard" before bathing. Give the sealant a few minutes to dry before the bath. I know this all sounds like a lot of work, but believe me it's much easier than dealing with cracks, hoof wall separations and thrush, not to mention an un-sound horse that cannot be ridden.

All these issues can cause lameness or hinder your horses ability to perform at their best. In future articles, I will go into more detail on each infection listed and other hoof care concerns. Making Your Application The Best It Can Be:

Tips from
The Dressage Foundation's
Selection Committee
Members and Staff

Each year, The Dressage Foundation receives hundreds of grant applications. It is always difficult for our Selection Committees to choose the best candidates for each funding opportunity. How can you stand out from the rest?

We've put together some guidelines and tips for you to consider, in order to help you make your application be as competitive as possible. While we can't guarantee that any one individual will receive financial assistance, since the final decision is always in the hands of our independent Selection Committees, we can offer some suggestions.

1. Begin the process early. With work, school, riding, and family obligations, finding the time to devote to the application process can be difficult. If you feel rushed, you will skim over important details in the application. Incomplete or incorrect applications are not sent to the Selection Committee for review, so be sure to give yourself enough time to gather all required parts of the application and double (or triple!) check to make sure that everything is included before you submit your application.

Allow enough time for your application to reach our office. If the deadline is September 15th, that means that your application MUST reach our office on or before September 15th. There are no exceptions to this rule. The earlier you start the process, the more relaxed you will be, the more your application will follow the format required, provide all necessary information, and allow you time to call with any questions.

2. Read all information before beginning the application process. Remember to do this every year as requirements may change from year to year. If the instructions say to submit your application online, do so. If the instructions say to mail a certain number of copies to our office, then proceed in that way.

3. Consider the funding opportunities. What are your goals? How do your goals fit with the grant or scholarship that interests you? Sometimes it is easy to "stretch" the interpretation of a program or fund's stated purpose to match what you want to do. Be aware that other applicants will take a more literal approach and those that most closely match the stated purpose of the fund will score better with the Selection Committee.

Do you meet the criteria as stated by The Dressage Foundation? What is the amount of the financial assistance available from the Foundation? Is your application appropriate?

Also consider what other assistance is available to you. Does your GMO or dressage club offer scholarships?

4. Review your application. Proofread for grammar and typos, as these can make even the best application look as if it was thrown together at the last minute. If possible, have someone else read through your application. Consider how it will look to someone on the Selection Committee. If you were on the Committee, how would you score the application? Take a close look at the requirements. Do you meet or exceed all the requirements? Do you "somewhat" meet the requirements? Are there areas where you do not meet the requirements? If so, you may want to work on those areas and wait a year to apply for the grant or scholarship.

5. Closely review your budget. Do the numbers add up correctly? Have you included all expenses and income? Double-check your math and explain any areas that may be unclear to the Selection Committee.

6. Keep a copy for yourself. Before submitting your application, be sure to print or otherwise keep a copy for your records. You will not receive your application back after the selection process.

Now that you've made sure that your application will be a contender, how do you make it rise to the top?

Our Selection Committee members are busy people. They don't have time to read a book about each applicant, so keep your application simple and relevant. Answer the questions completely, but keep the information pertinent to the question (don't go off on a tangent, telling a long story that wanders away from the point of the question).

Make sure the information clearly and concisely illustrates WHY you are the best candidate for this grant or scholarship.
